

Results of Outreach

- Old Heijplaaters
- Industry (workers and employers)
- Governmental agencies
- Elected officials
- Organizations (churches, NGOs)
- Familiarity with neighborhood
- > Developing trust and acceptance



Outreach Message

- Initial focus on short-term problems of Heijplaat
- 2. Build up to addressing the longer-term issues of sustainable development for Rotterdam

Overarching Goals:

- Participatory process where everyone feels
 empowered
- Encourage reflective practice
- Establish an ecology of agents
- Make the process self-sustaining



Initial Resident Meetings

> Informal Meetings

- Two meetings a month
- Main idea was to engage all the stakeholders
- Issues discussed included noise and safety

> Outcome

- Helped acquaint the new and the old Heijplaaters
- People started discussing the problems
- Encouraged stakeholders to attend the first town hall meeting



Kick-off Town Hall Meeting

- Present the message
- Split into groups to discuss the problems
 - Offer each stakeholder an opportunity to air their views
 - Agree upon definitions of problems and visions
- Reconvene
 - Present group definitions
 - Agree on definitions of the problems and the vision
- Determine topic of the first follow-up meeting
- Present timeline and process structure



Outcome Kick-off Meeting

- Problem definition
 - Noise
 - Safety
 - Pollution

Vision

- Livable community; port connection; safe and quiet housing
- Lasting connections between residents, industry, agencies, and other actors



A shift in scale: considering the lessons of our short term process for a larger context and longer timeline.






Switching Scale: Why Is it Possible?

Actors


- Stakeholders from the short-term process
