1. The challenge or theme illustrated by this episode:
2. Brief statement of context: This episode relates to actual event that took place at an earthquakes reconstruction project that I was associated with about 15 years back. Essentially this involves bloated ego of the representative of a major international donor agency, who took comments of a simple villager personally and saw to it that his house is not constructed with the aid funds that his organization had provided.
