Mercantilism, 1492-1815 Semi-arbitrary starting point

- Use of military power to enrich imperial governments
- Examples: East India Company, controls on colonial trade (tobacco, tea)
- Fighting between European powers over colonies and wealth
- Sovereignty norm develops(Peace of Westphalia, 1648)

Sovereignty norm develops

The Peace of Westphalia involved (1) Dutch Republic and Spain, and (2) Holy Roman Empire, France, Sweden (+ allies)

- Each prince has sovereignty over territory
- Each prince can determine religion of own state (Catholicism, Lutheranism, Calvinism)
- Some recognition of religious minorities

Pax Britannica, 1815-1914

- ► Napoleon's defeat in 1815 establishes British hegemony
- ► Britain establishes free trade, economic integration
- ► 100 years of relative peace in Europe
- European scramble to colonize continues
- Britain balances to avoid overly powerful coalitions
- ► The Gold Standard underpins "first era of globalization" ⁵

30 Years Crisis, 1914-1945

- ► Balancing fails, World War I (1914-1918)
- ► Victory is inconclusive
- Hyperinflation in Germany and elsewhere
- ► Great Depression
- Rise of Nazis/Fascists, World War II (1939-1945)

Cold War, 1945-1991

- Two superpowers emerge
- Europe is divided into East and West
- ► Berlin Airlift (1948-1949)
- ► Cuban Missle Crisis (October 14-28, 1962)



- Decolonization
- ► Collapse of Soviet Union (1989-1991)

Territorial Integrity Norm

- Emergence: 1917-1945 (norm upheld for the first time in the league of nations covenant)
- Acceptance: 1945-mid 1970s: In 1975 the last case of significant territorial revisionism occurred — Morocco's absorption of the Spanish Sahara
- Institutionalization: 1976-present: no major cases of successful territorial aggrandizement have occurred during this period. [Oops, Russia seizes Ukrainian territory in 2014.]
