
Ottoman Empire -- 1885



Ottoman Palestine, 1517-1917

- Palestine's population (Muslims, Christians Jews) was under Ottoman *Imperial rule*
- Islam and Islamic law ("Sharia") were the religion and the law of the land
- The administrative language was Turkish, the governor was Turkish, and so forth
- Under the Ottomans, Palestine
 was never administrated as a
 separated or autonomous
 administrative unit but rather was
 split among various different districts

Zionist Settlements, 1882-1914



British Mandate Palestine, 1917-1948


The Mandate System:

- Enforced by the League of Nations. Its declared goal: to assist the "primitive" indigenous population in achieving maturity and independence
- Iraq, which became a British Mandate, was the first to receive independence in 1932

Palestine's Mandate

- National rights are given to the entire Jewish people around the world; the Arab population of the country receives only civil rights
- Until 1939 preference is given to the Jews in immigration and land purchases
- Zionist community (*Yishuv*) is autonomous
- British rule brings modernization: in infrastructure, communication, government. Separation of religion and state
- From 1939 the British impose limitations on Jewish immigration and land purchases.







The "Sabre" (Arabic) cactus plant and fruit











1947 --- 87% of the Jewish population came to Palestine after 1918






