Capitalism and its "Others": Socialism

What are range of types of governments/economic arrangements confusingly referred to as "socialism":

- Communist countries Soviet Union and satellites centralized authoritarian governments and centralized planning; (Verdery refers to these as "state socialist" societies)
- Market-based democracies w/ strong welfare states Nordic countries

3) Marxist movements in formerly colonized regions in postindependence period of 60s-70s that followed still other logics

Why Did State Socialism Fall?

"It is not simply socialism's embrace with capitalism that brought about its fall but the fact that it happened to embrace a capitalism of a newly "flexible" sort." [Verdery cites David Harvey here]

"I am suggesting then, that the collapse of socialism came in part from the massive rupture produced by its collision with capitalism's speedup."

Does capitalism naturally follow after demise of state socialism in 1990s?

Verdery instead suggested "feudalism" – where loss of order at center led to rule by local and regional "bosses" [or mafias]

State bureaucrats engaged in "primitive accumulation" [plunder] of state or public resources and turn them into private holdings – hence the rise of the oliogarchs

Average citizens are ambivalent in light of "destatization" and "restatization" [state reconstituting itself along authoritarian if not state socialist lines] Verdery :

 focuses on everyday logics which are very different from abstracted logics of critics and supporters

-challenges teleological understandings of history

-does ethnography of state

-critic of both sides
