The Accession of Claudius

Claudius was disturbed by all this and alarmed for his own safety... There he stood in an alcove to which a few steps led, tucked away in the dark. Gratus, one of the Praetorian Guard, caught sight of him, but was unable to make out his features well enough to recognize him in the dim light... He approached nearer, and when Claudius asked him to withdraw, he pounced upon Claudius and caught him. On recognizing him, he cried to his followers, 'Here is a Germanicus: let us set him up as emperor and move fast.'


Aureus of Claudius, AD 41-42




