Portrait of a gendered hierarchy that maintains its power through law, institutional barriers, religious beliefs, customs, culture and violence Mixture of measurable/quantifiable goals (e.g., progress in education, employment, attaining suffrage, marriage law reform) and less measurable goals (improved levels of confidence and self-esteem)

Resolutions: Promise of continued commitment for the signatories (68 women and 32 men)
